Have you ever wondered how baseball for women became popular with time? Even if you haven't it is still a very interesting topic to learn about. In the articles "Amateur Women's Baseball Team Existed as Early as 1866" by Helen Thompson and "The Belles of Baseball: The All-American Girls Professional Baseball League" by Nel Yomtov this matter is discussed. These articles have information of how amateur women's baseball teams came to be during World War II, and how the league worked. This text can be better understood in a visual way if you see the video *Wilma Briggs reminisces about her baseball career* by Kathy Borchers. The articles by Thompson and Yomtov give information about girl's baseball and can be better understood with the video by Borchers.

The article by Helen Thompson is supported by the video since in the video pictures of baseball are shown. In the article it says "They were dubbed "Bloomer Girls" for the baggy Turkish-style trousers they'd wear during games"(para.3). Meanwhile in the video while not showing that exact team or their uniforms it still showed the uniforms of some of the baseball players when Wilma Briggs was talking about the pictures and even brought out her uniform. This while not being the exact same uniform is still a way both pieces of media were similar by showing some of the ways players used to dress during that time. In addition, the article talks about how the leagues came to be and how some girls ended up playing in the games. In the video we get a personal experience from Wilma Briggs which only adds more evidence to the article by having a unique perspective from a unique experience. Both the article and the video have similar, not same, pieces of information about girl teams in baseball.

In a similar manner, the article by Yomtov and the video by Borchers talk about scores some of the players used to have, while also quickly mentioning the prejudice woman had to go through. In the article, paragraph 4 is all about the talented athletes in the league, their scores and what they achieved. In the other hand the video shows how Wilma Briggs remembers her own experiences on the field when she used to play. This is the same as with the last article, while not being directly the same pieces of information they are similar enough to be comparable an even support each other as evidence of what is being said. In the texts, it gives historical information about women's baseball teams. The article "Amateur Women's Baseball Teams existed as early as 1866" states, "They were dubbed "Blooomer Girls" for the Turkish-style trousers they'd wear during games. These teams became particularly popular in the late 1890s and early 1900s, typically challenging local men's teams to games." The passage from *The Belles of Baseball: The All-American Girls Professional Baseball League* says, "During its 12 seasons, from 1943 to 1954, the league recruited more than 550 women ballplayers." This shows that the texts mostly give information about the history of women's baseball teams. They provide dates and they talk about events that happened during those times. The purpose of these two texts is to give basic background information regarding women's baseball and its events in history.

In the video, it gives information from somebody who got to experience being in a women's baseball league. In the video "Wilma Briggs reminisces about her baseball career," Wilma Briggs says, "Now when the league first started, there were no overhand pitchers beacause this was women's baseball. So when the league first started, the pitching was underhand and it was wither the windmill, like that, or it was like this. But they used baseball rules." In the video, Wilma Briggs talks about what was in the league and how they played. The video provides a visual representation and Wilma shows us the ball and how they pitched. This story of the women's baseball is being told from her perspective as someone who played for the league. She gives details that most historians would not be able to provide.

All of these sources are very helpful to a reader or someone who wants to know about the history of women's baseball.
